Continuity with change. That is the riddle, the challenge, which has been set by the Longdon and Gentleshaw residents in their responses to the recent parish-wide questionnaire.

Reflecting the views of over a third of all the parishioners, 90% of respondents clearly said we enjoy the rural setting, the cherished identity, access to areas of great beauty and the tranquillity. Residents want it to stay that way and are nervous of any development. But at the same time the villages and hamlets must not be fossilised; they need to be alive and active, and include the vigour of the young.

The Red Lion is one example; re-opening 5 pm on 15th August, it is essentially the same but providing for the changing demands of today. Similarly both primary schools in the parish have a change of head teacher next term but expect to continue their high standards. I send my best wishes to them in their endeavours.

Our plans for the future must listen to what is voiced and need: to provide for the young (housing and recreation); to defeat loneliness; to encourage community activity; to maintain family groups; to enable environmental appreciation; to promote diversity.

The task: enjoy continuity, accommodate change.

Both the Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group (NPWG) are hungry for your inputs – ideas, suggestions, criticisms. Further, NPWG seeks enthusiastic helpers for hands-on consulting, writing, distributing, and more. To volunteer, come to a meeting or contact a Councillor.

Notwithstanding plans, the Council continues to be concerned with the state of the lanes – pot holes, hedging, speeding, rat running – and urges S.C.C. for action before winter.

On behalf of the Parish Council I wish all readers "Happy Holidays" during this summer season.

There were displays of Model Planes, Birds of Prey and Skate Boarding for those who preferred just to "stand and stare".

The children were kept entertained by the many activities designed especially for them, these included a Bouncy Castle, Children's Tombola, (this was so popular that they ran out of prizes half way through the afternoon), badge making and a Tin can alley +Cards stall, I am still trying to work out what this one was.

Refreshments such as beef burgers, Strawberry teas, Pimms and soft drinks were provided by St James Pre-school, the PTFA and the Swan with two necks and made a roaring trade throughout the afternoon.

Mr and Mrs Larking did a sterling job of selling raffle tickets and the ladies from the school office worked hard controlling the rush at the School gate.

All in all it was a very successful afternoon, this was proved by the number of visitors who didn't want to leave the field and chairs and tables where cleared away around them, and raised a net profit of £1383.03.

The proceeds from the event will be divided between the PTFA and the other organisations within the Villages that provide services for children.

The community group and PTFA are already arranging their next events which include a repeat of last year's very successful Christmas sing-along and the schools Christmas Fayre. St. James' Churchyard

As a relative newcomer to the village, a member of St James Church and a keen gardener I have been helping the "groundforce team" in the upkeep of the churchyard the second Saturday of each month (10- 12 noon all help welcome, tea and biscuits provided!) I have been interested in the different styles of graves we have and how the fashions have changed over the years, from the Victorian tombs to the neat headstones we have today, colours in the stone have changed and so has the wording.

Recently taking on the role of churchwarden I have learnt that each new Chancellor of the Diocese is responsible for setting and administering the rules relating to churchyards and it is our duty to carry out these rules, which are not the same as cemeteries, run by the County Council.

These rules include the size, shape and wording and the type of material used in creating the headstone as well rules which help with the aesthetic look of the churchyard to help assist with the upkeep, (a cost which the congregation of St James church has to pay, fortunately with some help from the Parish Council).

Only fresh flowers, apart from Christmas and Remembrance Sunday, may be placed only on the nine inches of stone in front of the headstone. The rest of the grave or memorial, must be free from pots, rocks, planting etc to allow mowing to take place.



Cotton Almshouses Borough Lane

This year marks the 50th. Anniversary of the building of the three new Almshouses in 1964.

These replaced the old Alms buildings and school room which were built in 1815 and considered no longer fit for habitation. There was considerable controversy over planning permission for the new properties particularly from the then Staffordshire County Council, the Trustees finally winning an appeal to the National Planning Commissioners

The Trustees held a small celebration marking the anniversary at the home of the Chairman Mrs. Ann Juxon.

A celebration cake was provided by Mrs. Cynthia Tipper Trustee, this was cut by the guest of honour Mr. Robert Udall who was the Clerk to the Trust for some 30 years prior to the current clerk Mrs. Janet Allen taking over the role in 1988.

Janet kindly provided a display of old documents and minute books dating from the 1880's

The Cotton Almshouse Trust will celebrate it's 200 year foundation anniversary next year.


Some of our members opened their gardens on 26th May – due to inclement weather lunch was held in the Village Hall – this was a well attended fund raiser
