#### **GENTLESHAW COMMON**

What have we been up to on Gentleshaw Common?

The past few months have zoomed past and we are in the midst of

the winter season. This has meant that our volunteers have been busy cracking on

with the winter work that has to be completed before the end of March. Primarily, we have been targeting our time in clearing the West side of the Common of small silver birch, oak and pine. This area is very important due to its wet heath properties. We will have contractors in at the end of January for a week to continue on from our volunteer's hard work.

We have also been working on a small patch of secondary woodland, on the opposite side of Commonside Road. It's really encouraging to see Heathland species coming up through and we hope that with a bit of light, more will appear.

Although the winter months can be a little dreary at times, the Common still has plenty to offer, even if it is just for a walk to blow the cobwebs away on a blustery morning. With the leaves off the trees, it's a little easier to see bird life at this time of year. On a recent walk

out on the common, we saw five stonechats in one tree!

Stonechats are a lovely little bird, similar to the robin in size. The male has a striking black head with white around the sides of their neck. They have an orange-red breast and its call sounds like two stones being tapped together.

#### The Not So Secret Garden

#### **SLUGS**

Many of us will have woken to see our newly planted hostas, delphiniums, dahlias, gerberas, sweet peas and tulips eaten by garden pests. In the vegetable garden they like peas, beans, lettuce celery and potatoes. The soil temperature warms up and as Spring approaches it time to think about controlling slugs.

These pesky creatures are gastropods, single–shelled soft bodied animals. They use their tongues to make holes in leaves, stems, buds and flowers. Leaving behind trails of slime deposits.

The key issue here is that we only worry about the slugs we see, but in fact one cubic meter of soil can contain up to 200 slugs! They are hermaphrodites and can lay about 300 eggs in the soil at one time! There are many types of slug prevention available to use;

#### Slug Killers such as:

- Pellets. Take care when using these as it is important to apply these in the correct quantity to be safe to pets and wildlife and then reapplied every two weeks.
- Nematodes. So exactly what is a Nematode? It's a natural organism, already present in our soil. They start working early in the spring right down into the soil, and will keep regenerating until the food source has expired. They target specific garden pests giving us natural garden pest controls. They are environmentally friendly, safe for children, pets and wildlife. They are available to buy online.
- Barriers e.g. shells, copper tape or simply a scooped out half orange or grapefruit laid cup side down, or jars part filled with beer sunk into the ground near vulnerable plants.

#### Three tips to get the best from your nematodes:

- Apply the nematode solution to moist soil. Above 5 degree C
- It is best to do this during your evening watering as the soil won't dry out so quickly, giving the nematodes time to go beneath the soil.
- Plan to control slugs from early in the season when they are young and before they start to do the damage.
- Rake over soil and remove fallen leaves so the birds can eat the slug eggs these preditors should be encouraged.

Remember "prevention is better than cure!".

Longdon WI celebrated their 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday on the 11<sup>th</sup> January by holding a dinner party in the Village Hall. They entertained guests from SFWI

including the present Chairman, Helen Newman, past president Sheila Moulton, Glenys Richards

and members of the Rose and Shamrock Group including Rugeley, Armitage, Cannock Wood and Gentleshaw. Members were entertained by Ed Sumner, a young magician who demonstrated his amazing skills at each table during the dessert course, asking members to join in. After the meal, Chairman, Janet Drinkwater, read the following titbits taken from our archives.



"The first committee meeting was held in Longdon Vicarage at 6.0 pm on 4<sup>th</sup> January, 1922, attended by 10 committee member, the President was Lady Berkeley Paget (aunt to the Marquis of Anglesey). The first members' meeting, with 30 members, was held in the old Village Hall, with a subscription of 2 shillings, refreshments1d for a cup of tea and a 1d bun. After the business of the day May Johnson sang songs and Vicar, Frank Bygott, did some conjuring tricks. At the next meeting there was a lecture on Home Nursing. Competitions were for 'the best buttonhole' and 'the ingredients for a cake for 1 shilling'.

Jerusalem was sung at the opening, and the National Anthem at the end of each meeting. Each month each member was asked to bring an egg to be given to the local hospital, and at some meetings there was 'member participation' called Roll Call with suggestions 'How to get rid of flu', 'What is worth its weight in gold' and 'The advantages of being married or single?' The suggestion box was always full and by 1926 all suggestions were for the building of a WI hut. A 'Hut fund' was formed with lots of fund raising activities, and in 1936 Sir Villiers Forster (Landlord) and Mr Fernyhough (Tenant) agreed to sell a piece of land (which was where the school now stands!), but before purchase was completed the blacksmith's widow, Mrs Smith, offered the smithy to the members for £60, which was much better, and was purchased - Cost of Hall £60: Land at end £2: Refurbishment by Howard Marshall (whose son still lives in the village) £78: Extras £5: Total £145.

The opening and first meeting in the hall took place on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 1937 (Sadly Lady Berkeley Paget died at the end of 1936)."



The birthday cake was presented, with Mrs Minna Andrews longest serving member of Longdon WI and Mrs Kathleen Tatlow, who has been a member of the Womens Institute for 60 years, photographs were taken and the Chairman proposed a champagne toast to Longdon W I. Tea, coffee and mints were

then served with Ed Sumner on stage amazing everyone with his magic and amusing anecdotes.

Everyone agreed that the evening had been a huge success.

#### Brownies.


We worked on special beach challenge badge to help bring out the sunshine smiles on our Brownies.

**Longdon Pre-school** is open to children from the age of 2 years through to school age. We are open Tuesday to Friday 9.15 to 12.15 at the Village Hall.

In our run up to Christmas the children enjoyed a very busy, creative and at times messy term – glitter and glue everywhere. Having cleared the Christmas trimmings away they were ready to start a new term with new ideas. Our Little Stars (2year olds) got to grips with winter weather , snowmen, penguins and ice sculptures (containing glitter and sequins) not forgetting our feathered friends and made bird feeders, which the squirrels are also enjoying. They will then move on to look at Spring and the new life it brings.



The Little Explorers (3 year olds) have been busy practising their writing skills, in readiness to move to the next group the Little Learners. They have worked hard at straight lines, wobbly lines(curved) and marching lines (diagonal slants) using a range of resources and activities to help them. They even wrote their names in Chinese to celebrate Chinese New Year.

Our eldest group — Little Learners have been looking at measuring using NSU (non standard units) and traditional rulers and tape measures. Who would have thought that a table was 20 dinosaurs long by 10 cars high! They have counted and converted just about everything in the hall, including themselves and if that wasn't enough have counted and measured in Chinese. Their topic

has moved onto space and they have been looking at making space ship controls, paper mache planets, rockets, astronauts and maybe an alien or two.



The whole group enjoyed celebrating Chinese New Year with our very own dragon dance, musical instruments and trying different Chinese food for our snack. The children had great fun painting and decorating boxes for the dragon's head and body, making dragon masks and dancing puppets, creating rice pictures and participating in the story of the Great Race and how the Chinese New Year began. All of the children tried the different foods at snack with fresh lychees receiving very mixed reactions – but they all

tried something new.

As part of the Pre-school's safeguarding policy we hold evacuation drills where all of the children and staff must demonstrate how quickly and effectively we can evacuate the building.

Getting children to do things at the same time and when asked can be a problem ordinarily, so to have a group ranging from 2 years to 4 years, all busy in their play to respond can be quite a challenge, more so when you consider there are ten 2 year olds. However, we are

very, very, proud of all of our children who participated so well and did exactly as instructed. The only disappointment was that some of the children were expecting a fire engine to turn up – maybe another day and another topic to cover.

## St James The Great, Longdon



I am writing this article on the day that Donald Trump is to be inaugurated as the 145th President of the United States of America. It hasn't

happened yet, there are a couple of hours to go, but I am wondering how those who led the campaign for Hillary Clinton are feeling right now. Like all of us who have failed at anything, I am sure there will be regrets. Being human, there will probably be the apportioning of blame (usually to someone else) and hopefully some soul searching.

Our Lent Course this year looks, in part, at how regret feels, and how we can move forward from those feelings in our everyday life. Our explorations will involve watching and discussing a series of videos entitled "Tales from the Madhouse".

"Set in the crumbling walls of a dilapidated sanatorium. mysterious Victorian six characters reveal their secret stories. The six are linked by one unifying and crucial event in their lives: each of them had an encounter with Jesus of Nazareth in some way - an experience that has left an indelible mark. Each character brushed with Jesus, but most missed the moment. They touched the light that lingered in the shadows. They were offered freedom but made friends with their chains. Now they are haunted by the memory of what was, and what might have been." If you Alan Bennett's Talking Heads monologues, this is definitely the Lent Course for you!

Regret is a perfectly understandable human response to a variety of situations: you've made a big mistake; you've wasted an opportunity which won't come again; you wish you could go back in time and change things that seemed right then, but proved to be wrong.

Regret can be a positive emotion if it spurs us on to do better next time, or to reflect more before we act in future. But what isn't helpful is spending so much time regretting our actions that we become stuck. And God certainly doesn't want us to live lives that are weighed down by regret.

Jesus came so that we can live life in all its fullness, and that isn't being held in the past.

But there are ways we can move ourselves forward. First of all we need to honestly recall what we did and why. To Reflect on the actions, thoughts and emotions which drove us to do what we did, or not to do what we didn't. We need to make an honest inventory of our mistakes.

When Adam was confronted by his sin in the Garden of Eden, he went and hid in the bushes.

When David was confronted with his, he said "I am guilty before God." If we can follow David's example, and accept that we've made mistakes we shall be in the right place to Repent. Saying sorry is important 2 Corinthians 7:10 says "Godly grief produces a repentance that leads to salvation and leaves no regret". Sometimes we say sorry just because it's the expected response.

But when we truly regret something "Sorry" comes from our heart, and God can help us to make everything new.

When we have Reflected and Repented, we are in the right place to Refocus. One of the Bible's central themes is resurrection. That means that we too can start anew, remembering what God is like.

"Great is God's faithfulness, God's mercies begin afresh each morning."

So, if you find yourself regretting your actions take time to address those thoughts and feelings, and with God's help work through them.
